Provincial Online Tutoring Program

On Monday, January 12, 2009, CDLI, in partnership with the Department of Human Resources, Labor and Employment and School Districts launched a free Provincial Tutoring Program. This program will provide tutoring in most public exam courses including French 3200, Math 3204, Math 3205, Physics 3204, English 3201, World Geography 3202, World History 3201, Biology 3201, and Chemistry 3202. This program is meant to supplement the existing face to face tutoring currently available in schools. Online tutors will be available during various evenings

each week to assist students with academic difficulties. Students who have access to a computer and an internet connection will be able to receive online tutoring assistance from their homes or alternate venues. This online support is beneficial as many students often encounter problems understanding key concepts during evening hours.

Counselor's Corner

Can Marijuana Use Affect My Child's Mental Health?

Mental health, like physical health, is an ongoing process for each person with varying degrees of well-being that can change depending on environmental and personal circumstances. Marijuana use certainly can be and often is a factor that affects mental health status by either exacerbating pre-existing mental health concerns, or triggering mental health conditions that a person may be predisposed to. One of the mental health concerns that marijuana can both trigger and exacerbate is depression. Teens who use marijuana on a weekly basis double their risk of experiencing clinical depression as opposed to

their non-using peers. Regular marijuana-using teens also double their risk of experiencing clinical anxiety. Perhaps one of the reasons that anxiety and depression are associated with marijuana use is because THC, the active ingredient in marijuana, affects the brain's limbic system. The limbic system is one of the brain centres responsible for, among other things, emotion and fear. When an agent such as THC interferes with the brain's natural processes, mental health concerns may arise.

Other mental illnesses often associated with marijuana use are schizophrenia and psychosis. While schizophrenia is often in part a result of certain biological predispositions, environmental factors

must also be taken into account and this most certainly includes marijuana use. For example, researchers in New Zealand found that persons who used marijuana prior to the age of fifteen were three hundred times more likely to develop illnesses such as schizophrenia. The younger a person uses the drug, the higher the risk becomes and the subsequent schizophrenia symptoms increase in severity. In fact, some psychiatrists indicate that marijuana use is a notable factor in up to eighty percent of cases involving schizophrenia. Other research findings also suggest that frequent users of marijuana are up to seven hundred percent more likely at risk for psychosis than non-users and the risk increases in proportion to the

amount of marijuana used. While not all marijuana users necessarily experience clinical mental illness, these risks can not be ignored when addressing teens and marijuana use.

It is helpful to be informed of the symptoms of mental illnesses such as depression, anxiety and schizophrenia so that one can readily identify related mental health concerns if they arise. Parents who are concerned about their child's marijuana use and potential mental health afflictions are well advised to contact their nearest mental health centre for further information.
